You ever meet someone in desperation and feel connected immediately? That was my first encounter with Special Education icon, Mark Steven Kamleiter. Our daughter was in first or second grade and we felt that everywhere we turned there was a bucket full of NO!

- No she would not be a good fit here.
- No most kids like yours belong in a secluded environment.
- No your kid will never likely succeed in a mainstream space.
- No we cannot make accommodations for your child- (Even though it is in fact the law)
- No we simply CANNOT help you.

I remember endless days of tears and exasperation. How could I be an attorney and not adequately advocate for our daughter. I called the local bar association that day and asked do we have ANY special needs attorneys in the area. Thankfully I have a good relationship with our bar association and many of my peers in the community were aware of my new challenges. My colleague said there is this guy named Mark. We do not know what he does but he helps families like yours.

When I called the office I honestly felt I would have the same response-NO. Mark answered the phone, listened patiently and said YES! He literally said yes to EVERYTHING. I had no words. I was overwhelmed, exhausted, angry, frustrated and truly at "E" and this man, my angel said I will teach you how to care for kiddos like yours and others.

No question was off limits. Mark was honest and realistic. He shared that I would have a battle on my hands at every turn. Mark candidly shared the statement I now live by- "You do not know, what you do not know. Give them some grace and time to come around. In the meantime- educate yourself until they hear you."

This newsletter marks my "12" and is dedicated to the man who explained to me what an IEP is and why it matters and why it is different from a 504 plan. What a Functional Behavior Assessment is and a Behavioral Intervention Plan is. The importance of Positive Behavior Support, Speech Therapy, Occupational Therapy and the various levels of communications within the special needs community.

Mark passed away on March 8, 2020. I will not forget him or his commitment to shine a light for all who needed it.
