Originally from Chicago, Kim was raised by a Baptist minister who ingrained a sense of giving in her as a young child. She grew up in a privileged space for African Americans where she was raised to give back to the community that had given her so much. Her grandfather used to tell her, "you stand on the shoulders of giants and the price you pay is giving back to the next generation." So it was a sense of commitment to community in her household that sparked her inspiration to give back. There were though, some events that did influence the spheres in which Kim has focused her philanthropic energy.

Kim moved to St. Pete in 1997 where she practiced trial law locally and gained a passion for nonprofit advocacy with family-oriented agencies. She transitioned from her legal career to education, at St. Petersburg College, after her daughter was diagnosed with Asperger's syndrome. Her journey at St. Petersburg College was largely based on her commitment to equity. Kim thought that her ability to navigate the challenges of raising a child with a disability would be easier because of her economic and social position, but she found that wasn't the case. This eye opening experience encouraged Kim to delve into work creating access and equity, not just by advocating for families who have minors with cognitive disabilities, but also for all groups in the community that need access, information and opportunity, including African Americans and underserved children.

She wants to make a more equitable and just future for her community by breaking down meaningless artificial barriers. She wants to create more economic access for the underserved members in her community. For Kim her community involvement will result in more equity, more accessibility, more understanding and more acceptances.

Positive Dutcomes

Mayoral Internship Program

Kim has created positive outcomes for many individuals and families in St. Petersburg, but one outcome she is most proud of is the internship program with the mayor's office she helped to establish. Through her efforts to create access and equity in the community Kim was able to facilitate an internship program at the mayor's office, under the educational arm of St. Pete College, for students who had criminal backgrounds. Kim explained that some of the students who enrolled in the program had never even been to their city council; some had never left South St. Pete. Over 4 years, 3-5 interns a year, worked with Leah McRae, the Director of Education and Community Engagement for the City of St. Pete. This program gave these students access and greater understanding of their local government; it also showed them that a prior record was not the end of their journey.

As an Educator at St. Pete College

Kim helped students develop and helped them grow into contributing members in our society. "Professor Jackson is very understanding, and she's very caring. She took so much time to understand where I came from, and how hard it was for me in the program itself. She just really took the time to understand my needs, and she did not give up on me; she just really pushed me to do my best," said Tameika Johnson, a former student of Kim's.
